Letter from the Coordinator

Dear Friends,

Warm greetings to you from the AsiaCMS family! We deeply appreciate your partnership and prayers for AsiaCMS ministry. We thank the Lord for His guidance and leadership which has made what is shared in this newsletter possible. As we continue to lean on Him for the road ahead we count on you upholding us in your prayers.

The Nepal earthquake and its aftermath has left a colossal need and many have been moved to help in this hour of need. ACMS too has been involved in bringing restoration and rehabilitation to the affected people. It truly has been a humbling experience of standing with people who have lost much as they reach out to help others. If you, your Church or agency are moved to reach out to the need in Nepal do write to us. In the aftermath of the earthquake the country now faces an even more challenging political unrest and blockades which besides hampering relief activity are also causing adverse shortage of petroleum and other essential commodities in the country.

These past few weeks we have been witness and share in the pain and suffering of people in Syria, Africa and France. Let us continue to uphold them in our prayers. Let us also keep in prayers the thousands of Syrian refugees who are facing an uncertain and difficult winter ahead. We are reminded that we exist as the body of Christ in His Mission not in a vacuum but in the reality of the forces of darkness manifested in injustice, discrimination, persecution and violent conflict.

Let us continue to remember people in mission across South Asia, who continue to serve in increasingly difficult and challenging times. Challenges both direct and subtle continue to grow as religious intolerance, sectarianism, prejudice, discrimination and racism in various forms are on the rise. As we reach out with the message of salvation in Christ may we also be vessels in His hand to heal divisions, which is possible through Jesus (Ephesians 2:14). As we respond to the great commission "Let us therefore make every effort to do what leads to peace and mutual edification" (Romans 14:19) as His people.

AsiaCMS works in close collaboration with local and national Church and Mission through training, resourcing and networking. It is our burden and prayer to see this ministry fully supported 'from Asia to Asia', strengthening the Body of Christ in the region. Please continue to pray for us and stand with us.

NEPAL EARTH QUAKE RELIEF AND CURRENT CHALLENGES



ACMS have worked alongside our Nepalese Co-Mission Partners to help in relief and rehabilitation. Relief materials like foods items, tents and zinc sheets were provided in different parts of Nepal specially to the earthquake affected areas of Dhading, Dolkha, Gorkha, Ramechhap and Nuwakot. We are thankful to God and for the generosity of His people, which allowed us to be a blessing in a small way to help the earthquake victims to have food and shelter as they pieced their lives back together.

We were also encouraged by the support of the South Asia Christian Youth Network (SACYN) youth from India who raised support from their churches and friends for SACYN Alumni in Nepal to provide food and essential supplies to the affected people.

As we move forward, Nepal is facing another big challenge in the form of economic blockages resulting from political



unrest caused by aspects of the new constitution, which are deemed unfair to some ethnic groups on the border between India and Nepal. This has led to an acute shortage of petroleum products and essential commodities from India into Nepal. The situation remains challenging at the time of publication of this newsletter.

Reconstruction of infrastructure is still a pressing need, as many homes, institutional buildings and churches need extensive repairs and reconstruction. Our Co-Mission Partners are committed to meeting this need, and we would really value support which can be raised to help fulfil this key task.

Please continue to keep Nepal in your prayers, both for the earthquake relief as well as for the unrest and shortages, which are now leading to geopolitical challenges.

SACYN 2015, New Delhi

AsiaCMS is the coordinating partner for the South Asia Christian Youth Network which since 2002 annually brings together youth leaders from churches in South Asia to connect and also for a time of training and reflection on issues relevant to church, mission and society in the regional context.

SACYN 2015 was held at the Gandhi Peace Foundation, New Delhi, India, from 16th to 20th October 2015 on the theme 'Spirituality and Integrity in Youth Leadership'. It was a reflective-planning gathering. As the three years of training module was completed in 2014, SACYN 2015 focused on a reflection on the journey of SACYN for the past 12 years, as well as looked forward and planned for the future in the light of those reflections. The reflectiveplanning sessions were complemented with interactive sessions on Christian leadership, facilitated by senior church and mission leaders.



Group Work

Twenty-four youths from five countries attended the meeting. It provided an amazing platform for sharing of ideas and casting vision for the future. SACYN 2015 provided a space for interacting and understanding various challenges faced by Christian youths in the region, and also contributed to developing a generation of Christian children and youths. Time for personal reflections, regular worship sessions, prayer time, Bible studies, and input sessions from the resource and case studies on the impact of SACYN to individual churches presented by each of the member churches provided a clear understanding of SACYN's journey and impact at the church level over the years. Also, the evaluation and planning sessions done on the theoretical framework of appreciative enquiry enabled the participants to evaluate the previous sessions of SACYN and to look forward to the future with hope.

- ÷ Please keep in prayers the health and protection of all AsiaCMS Co-Mission Partners, staff and volunteers as they continue to serve in the region.






Gateway 2015 Group

Asia Gateway Training is a unique 'Training of Trainers' in Asian contexts offered by ACMS in partnership with other agencies to equip people for mission in Asia. Our South Asian partners who attended this training greatly benefited from it. This year, the training was conducted at the Seminari Theologi Malaysia, Seremban, Malaysia from 21st June to 8th August. Eighteen participants from South Asia (India, Pakistan, Nepal), East Asia (Malaysia and Cambodia), Western Europe (UK), South America (Brazil) and Australia participated in this intensive seven-week training. The wonderful multi-cultural environment of the training provided a great opportunity to learn from each other.

The majority of the participants were church and mission leaders from diverse backgrounds, agencies, and denominations. The training, which included a one-week field trip to Cambodia, provided opportunities to understand the cultural uniqueness of Asia as well as the need for mission in this context. Each of the participants was really enriched and motivated to adapt and apply what was acquired from the training to each of their own training programmes in their respective contexts. Dr Kang San Tan and Loun Ling were the resident trainers, who, along with other internationally acclaimed lecturers made the training a memorable one.

This is a great training ground for missions in Asian context as it provided a first-hand opportunity to understand Asian religions and cultures as well as learning with and from people from various regions. BHUTAN VISIT AND WORKSHOP

Support to Abused Children Partner: Esther Gnanakan Organisation :LEEDS Location: Colombo, Sri Lanka



In Sri Lanka, as in India and other South Asian countries, the rate of child sexual abuse is very high. LEADS is a Christian organization based in Colombo,

Sri Lanka, which provides holistic support for children who are abused. Esther Gnanakan serves with LEADS as part of its ESCAPE programme through her service as a child psychologist bringing healing and hope to them. It has been a privilege to walk alongside Esther and LEADS these past three years. Do continue to keep Esther in your prayers as she finishes her commitment within the Co- Mission Partner Programme and continues in her ministry. Community Outreach and Training Partners: J.Saidingliana Sailo & Melody K.Lalbuatsaihi

Organisation:ACN, Pokhara Bible School Location: Pokhara, Nepal



Melody and Sailo a r e b a s e d in Pokhara, Nepal and serve alongside Asal Chimeki Nepal, which is the social arm of around 40 churches in the city. They arrived in Nepal in April of this year and within a couple of weeks of their arrival the earthquake struck Nepal. After the earthquake, political and ethnic unrest continues to be a challenge in the country. Please keep the family in your prayers as they study the Nepali Language and begin their ministry in the region.

Melody, who is a trained staff nurse, works with the heath team and with the home for women in substance abuse. Sailo is teaching at the Pokhara Bible College which trains grassroots missionaries and rural pastors from villages and districts surrounding Pokhara. They are also connecting with local churches and request prayers for their time in Nepal to be a blessing to the body of Christ in the region and to witness Christ through their lives and service.

Peace and Reconciliation Partners: Chitra & Rabbi Jayakaran Organisation: Peacemakers

Location: Bangalore, India

In a world torn by violence and conflicts, Rabbi & Chitra are involved in peace and reconciliation ministry bringing restoration and reconciliation to indi-



viduals, families, organizations and communities. They are involved in teaching and training in colleges, seminaries and organizations on conflict transformation and peace building. Rabbi is currently teaching peace and conflict resolution studies in Christ University and also pursuing his MPhil in Peace Psychology. They are beginning rehabilitation work with women prisoners and their families and request prayers for this work.

Co Mission Partner Program (CoMP)

AsiaCMS partners with local mission movements in supporting and equipping local leaders to engage in mission.

The Co-Mission Partners are serving in challenging places bringing the hope of Christ to people in difficult circumstances. We are privileged to currently partner with churches and mission organisations across South Asia to send out 20 Co-Mission Partners serving in different parts of India, Nepal and Sri Lanka. They are doing amazing work, making Christ known through evangelism, discipleship, drug rehabilitation, counselling for abused children, training church leaders, equipping first generation believers, HIV-AIDS rehabilitation and more. Alongside here is a glimpse of the work of three of our partners bringing hope, healing and transformation in the lives of people facing difficult circumstances.
